****UPDATE FROM OUR INFANT GB****

It's that time of year when many of us find ourselves saying, *"I can't believe it's Christmas already!"* We're ticking off lists and doing our best to make sure our children are ready to enjoy all the festive activities. This year, I've felt time passing more keenly than ever: I joined the Governing Body when my eldest son was in Foundation and he left school for good this summer. 14 years as a governor at All Saints Infants - where did they go?

It's time for me to step down, but before I do, I'd like to explain why being a governor has been such an important part of my life. All Saints is a remarkable school, rooted in a beautifully diverse community and led by an immensely talented staff team. What sets it apart is a spark of real magic that seems to shine especially brightly at this time of year. I saw it in my children - the pride they took in their learning, the way they were known and loved at school, and the confidence and sense of belonging they carried with them. That magic - which I would call joy - made me want to be part of it.

A school like All Saints doesn't come about by accident. It requires a clear vision, a strategy to make that vision a reality, and policies which keep it on track. And none of these things are effective without the endless dedication of staff, governors, parents and volunteers. What I have learned is that we're building something that lasts: the magic doesn't fade away once our children leave the school. The foundation of joy that is created at All Saints will be with them their whole lives – what an incredible privilege to be part of that!

Governors work consistently to make All Saints even better. We review data and policies, monitor progress, and act as a "critical friend", asking questions that challenge and support the school. We take the long view: *"Where do we want the school to be in five years?"* as well as keeping an eye on the day-to-day: *"What progress are we making in Maths this term?"* But we also visit the classrooms and see the learning in progress, share lunch with the children, have the opportunity to get to know the incredible staff and take part in every aspect of school life. At the centre of everything is the children and that's why it's worthwhile. We know as parents that creating magic takes time and effort, but keeping the joy at the heart of the work is the All Saints way.

Now, we have seats to fill on the Governing Body—not least mine. You don't need to sign up for 14 years (I promise!), but if you've seen that same spark in your own children, I wholeheartedly recommend that you look into becoming a governor. We all bring different experiences and skills, and all of them are needed to make the magic happen; you are definitely the right person to support, encourage and protect the joy.

I love this school, and I am so proud of it. It's been a hard decision to step down, even though it's the right time. I have been lucky enough to play a small part in hundreds of children – your children, and mine – growing and learning and becoming amazing All Saints citizens, ready for their next step, taking that spark of All Saints magic with them wherever they go.
